I had never been to a Michael Bolton show before and had heard he was a very good performer. Some of the other fifteen ladies had brought with them photo albums stuffed with their glossy treasures from past Michael encounters ranging from concerts to golf tournaments. Although the stories were different as were the people recounting them, the theme was all the same: Michael had touched all of these people in a way that was special to them, and Michael was one heck of an amazing guy.

With what seemed only minutes to spare, our driver (awesome guy, by the way) pulled into the Clemens Center and right next to Michael's tour busses. We were fortunate enough to see Tre outside and with very little persuasion, Meri had Tre step into the bus and greet us all. What a gorgeous smile he has!

A few times I heard someone yell out, "LOSE THE JACKET", or "TAKE IT OFF", and had to laugh. I had heard about the banter between Michael and the audience but never believed it until that moment. Another lady yelled out, "NO ONE'S DANCING UP HERE", and so in classy Michael style with a smile from ear to ear, he replied "AND WHAT DID YOU WANT ME TO DO ABOUT IT? I COULD COME UP THERE..." and the audience burst into applause. He then got on with the show. More great music and more fun - I was having a blast.

Then he had to run backstage to change into the ever-popular jeans and t-shirt and when he came back on stage, the audience roared their approval. He went right into song, gave everyone a nice view of his backside (I'm starting to think he enjoys that), put on the FDNY hat and rocked the venue.

In the end, the show was phenomenal, the vocals were better than perfect, the band was awesome, the dancers worked their butts off and I didn't take a single picture (I was too busy watching the show). 



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### VERONA, NY TURNING STONE CASINO SEPTEMBER 29-30, 2003

The best things in life are worth wating for. But sometimes, it's a little harder to convince yourself of that... I had purposely held off listening to the sound clips of « Vintage » on the fan club web site, so I could enjoy the album in all its splendor, when I got it in the mail. And for that, I'm happy to say, it worked! But, as I was sitting at the top of the stairs of my house, after I'd hung up the phone from my friend Sue, I had to re-think about that. She had just called to give me a quick run-down of the gala weekend she had just attended with our friend Robin, including the Elmira concert... She had put her cell on speaker-phone and I was torn, listening to the joyous sounds of my friends, as they were telling me how awesome everything had been... The words: « Smile, though your heart is aching... » ran through my head... I wasn't able to attend any part of the gala weekend because of family obligations. As I hung up the phone, I thought: »Only 11 more days till it's my turn! » I had to repeat it a few times before it started sinking in.

When I first heard about the new tour, a few months back, I had to figure out which concert was most doable for me. And since I knew I couldn't make the fan reception, I had to pick one that all my Bolton buddies could come to. Foxwoods was it. It was also the most expansive but, it was a small price to pay to see my friends again. Plans were made long in advance and things were falling into place. Sadly, only two out of three of my initial BB group could make it but, as the song goes: "wtwo out of three ain't bad"... This year, my husband would come with me. We hadn't taken a "couple" vacation in a good while and this was just the right excuse to spend some time together, away from our day-to-day routine with our four kids.

We had a long drive ahead, going from the Montréal area, in Qc Canada to Groton CT so we decided to leave on Thursday night, after tucking the kids in. I knew the kids would be well taken care of during the weekend but, since they're not used to me not being there for a few days, I felt a tug, as they were all clinging for their last hug.

As we left the house, I asked my husband to put on the Delilah radio show in the car so I would still feel like I was home, watching over things. It took us about an hour to get to the border. The lady booth attendant asked us our reason to go to the States and my husband told her that for a belated anniversary present, he was taking me to a concert. She asked which one it was and she went Oh!, when he told her it was Michael Bolton. You gotta love people with good taste! Along the way, listening to Delilah paid off and we heard « When I fall in love ». I knew I could count on her! We got to the Super 8 in Latham N Y around midnight and turned in right away because we knew we'd have to get on the road early.

Early ended up being a quarter to 10. But we knew that after breakfast, we wouldn't have to stop till we got there. We arrived in Groton around 2:00 p.m. We checked into the Groton Super 8, grabbed a bite and headed for Foxwoods. My friends and I agreed to meet in line there. They would take turns waiting. But I had a dilemma: you see, I'm legally blind and have no pictures of my friends and couldn't describe them much to my husband. What could I do? Thankfully, when we found the line, one of them recognized me and called out to me. I greeted her with a big hug, which I had a feeling was much needed at that point. My friends had both been waiting for several hours already and sounded exhausted, by the time I got there. So we joined the group. This waiting for hours in line thing is all new to me but I really enjoyed the experience of meeting a bunch of Bolton buddies. Several names I heard were familiar to me, because of hearing them at the end of fan articles and such. That was fun. I even reconnected with another Bolton buddy I had met at last year's gala weekend and that was a special treat. We talked about how much we loved « Vintage » and our favorite songs, caught up on the news and I introduced her to my husband. The time when the venue opens its doors got closer and I debated whether to eat or not. My husband wandered off, I assumed he was looking for a quick snack and he came back with a box, handed it to me and said this was my supper. I opened the box and first found an OAWLY T-shirt! I was very happy because I couldn't find one last year. Reaching in, I cracked everybody up, asking what was the dessert? I also got the « Vintage T-shirt and the « Vintage » CD with the bonus track. That would surely fill me up till showtime! (smile) (continued)

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Then the doors opened and we got in. Holding \$110 tickets, we were some of the fortunate ones who were seated in the second row! I couldn't believe it! Not that it changes much my perspective of the show but, it's just wonderful to be able to say: I had second row... Waiting for the show to start, I thought it was neat to hear Scott Mayo's music in the theater. I knew he wasn't in the band this year but I've grown to really enjoy his CD, after buying it last year. I still hadn't heard anything from my friend Sue and was getting worried. I finally decided to ask my girlfriend if I could use her cell to call Sue's cell. They were already playing the announcements as her phone rang. « Where the heck are you? » I asked her as she answered. « Where did you get a hold of a cell phone? » she asked and I told her. She was right outside and was just about to hand her tickets in. Sigh of relief!

The familiar notes of « America the beautiful » sung by Ray Charles started filling the theater. My friends Sue and Dan made it to their seats in the fourth row, as the song was ending and the applause and hollers from the audience grew stronger. Love Is A Wonderful Thing » kicked off the show. I love the energy of that song and I always sing with Michael but it's funny how, in the beginning, I always listen first, to kind of connect with the fact that he's really there... I felt the concert sap mounting and the fan in me overtook the genteele wife! Lol Bless his heart, my husband knows how much I love music and how much I get into it... Then our old friend « Soul provider » came along. Michael said he was having fun on this tour. Someone yelled out: »So are we! » That made him smile... He said he was starting to see some of us at several shows. He always encourages us to make as much noise as we want and most of us obliged!... Then, the ever-popular « Said I loved you, but I lied ». I have to say that at the end, I closed my eyes and indulged in the sweet surrender of listening to the last lingering note... Mercy! What can I say? Michael's voice is my favorite sound...Then Michael sang last year's energetic « I wanna hear you say it », before the Timeless set. He started the set with « To love somebody », which he tests us to sing all the parts. I did sing them all, except the guitar solo! Lol The acoustic rendition is always a sweet intimate experience. Oh, here's a little known fact: Barry Gibb said that the Bee Gees wrote this song and, had he not passed away, Otis Redding himself would have recorded it. I think it's a lucky coincidence that Michael sings it right before »Dock of the Bay». Michael introduced the old gang; Schuyler, Chris and he underlined the fact that Joey Melotti's back. Moving on to more sure fire hits, Michael sang the beautiful and timeless « Drift away ». This year's Uncle Cracker/Doby Grey version made it to #1 and has so far stayed there for 18 weeks on the Billboards A C chart. Michael knows how to pick 'em! I thought of my friend Robin who was missing from our group... She adores this song... According to Casey Kasem, Uncle Cracker thinks it's a song about nothing... I think he may have missed the boat on a couple of lines like: »...when my mind is free, you know your melody can move me. And when I'm feeling blue, guitars coming through to soothe me... » What else is there to say? The Timeless set ended with another one we hadn't heard in a while; »Reach out ». That was a nice surprise! That is one of my favorite songs live!

Michael then said that as long as we were in a classics kind of mode, it was time for the « Vintage » songs. If there is only one thing Michael Bolton and I have in common, it's the love of music and singing. I just love the way he describes these standards as: »exquisite and brilliant in their simplicity »... not to mention a delight to sing and to listen to. For me, « Vintage » was a love at firstlisten experience. Michael said last year that he loved singing « Only a woman like you » because everything about the song was a joy to sing, as opposed to other times and other songs in which he can't wait to get to the chorus or the bridge for instance. I have a hunch that it might be the same case with the entire new album. I love the fact that for the show, he picked two songs that are close to his heart, because they're Ray Charles songs and the third one, is seemingly as close to his heart, but it's one he could have fun with and really let loose. After the Ray Charles classic « you don't know me », when he introduced « If I could », he started talking about the connection to the song and his daughters. Most specificly Taryn, whose birthday it was, that day. She turned 24, if I'm not mistaken. Michael started singing... I took a deep breath, closed my eyes and went with the emotion... Frankly, I don't know how he can sing this one live. I know all the words but can never make it all the way through... This song is the one I feel the closest connection with, especially at this specific time in my life, for many reasons. I had told my BB Debbie that it was one of my favorite songs on the album and she told me she took a picture of Michael singing it and would send it to me. I thought that was so sweet of her! I know I won't see it but I'll treasure it. The last song of this set was « Summertime ». Lord knows I love the Sam Cooke version of it and can even appreciate the Janis Joplin rendition but I'd never heard it sung with so much gusto! It's a great song and Michael just blew me away!! That was my favorite performance of this particular show, well, new performance anyway...(continued)





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That was followed by the always mesmorizing power-houses of the show: »Go the distance » and « Ness un dorma ». In between those two, Michael said that people who had seen this show before... knew exactly what he was gonna say... That got him a laugh... It's fun to see how quickly he switches from being silly to talking about the continuing exploration of the world of music he's found...

All right, now time for the band jam and break time for Michael. This sounds like it's just a demonstration piece but it's a great opportunity to showcase all the individual talents of this solid group of musicians and they rocked! The melody was led by Jason, the new sax player and judging from the way Joey played that piano, it sounds like he's glad to be back! This was just an instrumental, no written song medley this year.

Breaktime over, time for « When a man loves a woman ». My husband asked me if Michael was doing the up-and-down the isle thing any more. I was told last year that he doesn't. He starts off my appearing on stage, in silhouette and then comes forward. He was still faithful to his « ...turns his back on his best friend... »/buttshot deal, which brought him the usual screams and hollers from the audience! I wouldn't admit that I get a kick out of the mental picture (lol) but I always relish in the way Michael makes this song linger and work it slowly into your soul...

Change of gear, now time for the « stand up from your seat and clap to the beat » Bolton classic set! We heard « How can we be lovers », « Steel bars » and « Time, love and tenderness ». During TLT, which is my friend Sue's favorite song, my husband told me that Sue's husband Dan took her to the stage to shake Michael's hand... Dan told Sue that Michael closes his eyes, when he shakes her hand, as if to embrace her blindness... What a guy! My first reaction was « Oh, lucky her! » but I was happy for her. My sighted friend told me that, if there was a fan rush to the stage, that she'd come and get me. Nothing so far... After the big finale, Michael thanked everybody and left the stage. Everybody joined in the customary call for the encore. Luckily, it didn't take too long before he came back because my voice was pretty much shot at this point! Michael came back and started playing the first rif of « Rock me baby » and paused. Then he revved it up again and rocked me baby! Lol A minute or so into it, my girlfriend came and called me. She didn't need to say more. I jumped up and grabbed her hand. We just stood at the end of the row, clapping, dancing and punctuating the song with hollers... I think it was a great move to start including this song in the show last year because I love the way Michael sings and plays it and it's another great demonstration of his terrific band who were in excellent form! Then, the second big finale...

When the song was over, my girlfriend started to move. I held on to her arm and we went to the stage. I didn't know if they'd all left but I nervously followed her. She extended my left hand and called out to Michael... Without a word, Michael came to us and I felt his right hand in mine... Oh my God! He curled his hand into mine and I felt something... My friend said: "He just gave you his pick, didn't he?" He had held it in my fingers until it was secure and then let go... I was in shock! Lol We both thanked him and he left. I heard a Bolton buddy say: "All this and he's a nice guy too!" My friend asked to look at my pick and I reluctantly let her have it... for about 8 seconds! She checked it and sure enough, it was autographed! We gathered up our gang and said our goodbyes. I was really glad we each had our own little special moment with Michael. I don't know if Michael realizes how precious to us these moments are... Whether it's a smile, a handshake, a laugh or for a lucky few, a meeting. The memory of having made contact with someone who gives us so much joy, that's pure Bolton magic! I'll tell ya, I couldn't wipe the smile off my face all night! It's simply the greatest and certainly, well worth waiting for, all the way... Michael, "...thanks for the joy you've given me..."



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### WINDSOR ONTARIO CHRYSLER THEATRE OCTOBER 7-8, 2003

I travelled from Santa Barbara, California to Windsor, Ontario to see Michael perform at the Chrysler Theatre two nights in a row. I had quite a time convincing the Border Patrol that I had come so far for these shows, but I would like to share that it was well worth every mile and I am so glad I made the trip!

The shows opened with one of my all time Bolton faves, "Love Is A Wonderful Thing", and I am always so proud when Michael performs that song. It's a great show opener, and I start right away clapping to the beat and enjoying the show! It was so wonderful to see Michael again!

The concerts featured familiar Bolton hits and many of the Classics from Timeless, including one song I'd never seen him perform before, "Hold On, I'm Comin". For those who have attended Bolton shows in the past, the format on this mini tour resembles snippets from previous shows, like a singalong Classics set with Chris Camozzi and Schyler, and a powerful rendition of "Go The Distance" and of course, the aria "Nessun Dorma" brought the house down.

This being the VINTAGE tour, three songs from the new cd were performed by Michael. "You Don't Know Me", a familiar ballad, is one of my favorites from VINTAGE. Then he did a stirring version of "If I Could", relating to the audience that this was his personal expression as a parent.

Then the bluesy, hot, simmering "Summertime" wowed the crowd with classic Bolton style and grace. The VINTAGE cds sold out at the venue on the first night!

The band, Janis and the dancers combined to present a very tight backup to Michael's voice and stage presence. Saxophone was featured prominently in these shows, too. I felt the touch of blues fit well with the VINTAGE theme, and pulled together Michael's work on other songs in the show as well.

The last several songs in the show were all about FUN! Those who follow Michael know to expect to rock to these great songs, when he has traded off his suit for his jeans and the rest is history once again! It was that familiar, versatile, talented VOICE and the beat of our favorite Bolton hits, plus an encore of "Rock Me, Baby" to climax the evening's entertainment!

I want to thank Michael, the band, the crew, and the staff that puts the tours together. 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





Post to an internet message board regarding the new American Idol, Clay Aiken...but seems relevant here as well...

I am a "serious" musician who has been writing songs since he was about 14(now 34). I grew up playing electric guitar (lead and rhythm) in hard rock bands and went on to become a "classical" composer (orchestra, piano, strings, and so forth). I am currently a professor of music theory and composition. I still enjoy writing "pop" songs though it is not my focus. Now that you know my background, please consider what I have to say about Clay, his album (which I thoroughly enjoy), and the music critics:

I am sure that there are many of you who are bummed about the bad reviews MOAM is receiving. Even though you probably expected it, it still gets your blood boiling, right? It's like a personal attack--"you like this garbage, so you must be stupid and gullable" seems to be the attitude of most reviewers out there.

PLEASE remember, that musicians and critics are two completely different animals. The reality is this: even the musicians who get rave reviews from critics have very little respect for music critics. Most musicians NEED good reviews, however, and so they court the critics as necessary. Sometimes a phenom like Clay comes along and simply doesn't need the reviews to succeed. The critics become irrelevant, and I imagine they don't appreciate being a footnote(not getting advance copies). I think this does explain some of the "mean" reviews. However, at the same time. I believe that these reviewers are telling the truth when they say they don't like the album. The truth is, critics are usually mediocre musicians and excellent writers(of words). I would rather read book reviews, because at least the critics are writing about their own area of expertise! When you read a pop-music review, the opinion of that particular writer is about as valid as the kid you know down the street who plays in a garage band. You know, the one who can play rhythm okay but isn't good enough to play solos. The one who thinks he is a lot better than he actually is. The one who has about as much chance of making it big as your 86 year old grandmother(unless your grandma knows Clive Davis). (continued)





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#### MUSICIAN'S POST (continued)

Most excellent musicians(like studio musicians who never get famous, or classical musicians who play in orchestras) are very open-minded about styles of music and wouldn't hate something simply because of the genre. That is because an advanced musician can critique a piece of music of ANY genre. To simply say that a song is bad because it is too "easy-listening" is a ridiculous way to think about music but that is exactly what most music critics do. When musicians listen to music, they say, okay, this a heavy-metal song so I will listen with those types of ears. Is it a good heavy-metal song? To simply say it stinks BECAUSE it's a heavy-metal song is ludicrous. But that is what most reviewers nowadays do. "It's pop-pablum" they say. Or it's good because it is "edgy."

They also think Clay has no talent because he doesn't write the songs himself. Again, MUSICIANS who know anything know that some musicians are performers and some are composers. Yo-Yo Ma isn't a composer. Does that mean he has no talent? These types of reviewers reveal their mediocrity in the field of music when they make these types of generic statements. They don't know enough about chord progressions, harmonies, how to write a good melody, form, orchestration, etc. to truly critique the quality of the music. So don't get blue about the bad reviews. Laugh them off. Most musicians I have spoken with regard Measure of a Man as a great POP album. The songs are all well-written, the arrangements are strong, and Clay's performances are all outstanding. These are the types of things that MUSICIANS appreciate. Listen to the musicians, not the critics.





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
